The purpose of the fair is to encourage science, math, and industrial arts students to develop, display and exhibit to the public a project of their own creativity. They will be eligible for valuable recognition and rewards, and will be able to show the public the fascinating work being done

Each project will be entered in the Senior (10, 11, 12 grades), Upper Junior (9 grade), or the Lower Junior (7, 8 grades) Divisions. They will then be classified as to individual topics, as Chemistry, Botany, Mathematics, etc. Judges will score most highly on creative ability and scientific thought involved in the exhibit. It is important that the exhibits also show thoroughness, skill, clarity, and dramatic value.

Mr. Thomas Barringer, who was associated with the fair last year, is on this year's Planning Committee, along with Mr. James Crutchfield, who is the mathematics representative from Hialeah High.

Most teachers will give A to those projects that merit entrance in the fair. Entry blanks may be obtained from Mr. Barringer after February 25.

Projects must be ready in time to meet the March 18 deadline, at which time they must be set-up in the auditorium.

To the two outstanding exhibitors in the Senior Division, go trips to the National Science Fair competition in Hartford, Connecticut, which are sponsored by the Miami Herald.

T. Mullaney Commended by National Merit Scholarship

One senior at Hialeah High school has been commended by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation for his outstanding performance on a nationwide test of educational development, according to Principal E. G. Pease.

The senior honored was: Tom Mullaney.

The Hialeah High students were the Florida runners-up in the 1958-59 Merit Scholarship Corporation. John M. Stalnaker, President of NMSC, believes that the 10,000 students who received the commendation rank in the top two or three per cent in ability of the senior students in their respective states and should be given every encouragement to continue with their education.

"While the students receiving this commendation did not quite reach the finals of the 1958-59 Merit Scholarship competition, each of them has demonstrated highly superior ability and outstanding promise to benefit from college training," declared Mr. Stalnaker.

"I hope that every one of them will make a special effort to obtain a college education. With further education, these young people can play a vital role in our nation."

The annual National Merit Scholarship competition offers the largest system of privately financed scholarships in the United States. The program is open to all high school seniors in the United States and its possessions.

Over 478,000 students in 14,600 high schools entered the 1958-59 competition, which began with the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test on April 29, 1958. Another group of about 10,000 students—the highest scorers in each state, prorated by population—were announced last October. These students, who have since been retested, are now Finalists in the competition, and the Merit Scholars of 1959, to be chosen from this group, will be announced about
