Stalnaker, President of NMSC, believes that the 10,000 students who received the commendation rank in the top two or three per cent in ability of the senior students in their respective states and should be given every encouragement to continue with their ed-

"While the students receiving this commendation did not quite reach the finals of the 1958-59 Merit Scholarship competition, each of them has demonstrated highly superior ability and outstanding promise to benefit from college training," declared Mr. Stalnaker.

The annual National Merit Scholarship competition offers the largest system of privately financed scholarships in the United States. The program is open to

Over 478,000 students in 14,600 high schools entered the 1958-59 competition, which began with the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test on April 29, 1958. Another group of about 10,000 students-the highest scorers in each state, prorated by population were announced last October.
