New Scholarships Offered Seniors

H.H.S. will receive its first benefits from the Henry Milander Scholarship Fund this year. \$250. will be given to any deserving senior of H.H.S.; providing that (1) he wishes to use the money for a college education and (2) one of his parents is a member of the Hialeah Civil Service Employees.

Each year the Milander fund will make the same offer. Student winning now may, as a freshman in college, again apply for the scholarship. If he wins he will receive another \$250.

This is not the only scholarship which is offered to H.H.S. students. Right now there are nine scholarships open for students interested in beauty culture. All one must do is write a composition on "Why I want to be a" For the winning composition there awaits scholarships ranging from \$75. to \$300. Scholarships also await students gifted in art. Three scholarships to the Miami Artists school and gallery are now offered to any student in Dade county.

All entries must be in by April 17, 1959. First prize is worth \$1200; the second prize has a value of \$600.; and third prize is valued at \$1990.

These are only a few of the scholarships available. Last year our school received \$88,000 in scholarships alone. Mr. Robert Mohr predicts that this year, H.H.S. will receive about \$100,000 in scholarships.

Four Earn Chance At Ala. College For Scholarship

Four girls of Hialeah High School are to get an opportunity to earn a scholarship at Alabama College, in Montevallo, Ala.

They are Carol Prichart, Elsie Scott, Barbara Deater, and Glenda Balowsky.

The girls had to fill out an application for scholarship consisting of general information. It required three recommendations, one from a teacher, one from a prominent citizen, and from the principal, Mr. E. G. Peace. Also the girls had to write a short account of their lives, and why they wanted to go to college.

These were sent off to Alabama College, all the girls were notified by letter, that they had been accepted. The letter stated that the girls were invited to the campus to participate in scholarship test and activities. The activities include: canoeing, attending two one-act operas, dancing, swimming, and tennis.

The girls will leave Wednesday, March 11, and are going to be taken by Carol Prichard's father. The girls will be there for registration Thursday, March 12. On Friday, March 13, the scholarship test begins.
