The judging of the Concert and Marching Band will be harder and much stricter because they are two separate special organizations year round, and entered in Class AA.

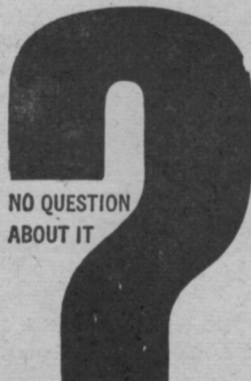
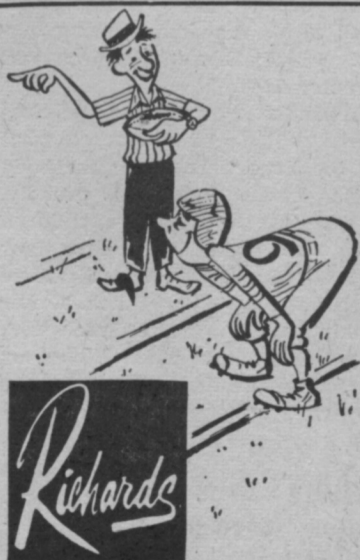
