## High Rating Marks Third For Record

For the third time in three years the Hialeah High RECORD has received a first-class rating in the Nation Wide Columbia University Press Contest.

Each year for three times in succession, Mrs. A. R. Miller, the journalism advisor, has sent the RECORD to Columbia University to be rated. At the beginning of the second semester last year to the end of the first semester this year Mrs. Miller sent two copies of each paper that was printed, to the University.

This contest is nation wide, and the school with the highest number of points receives a medalist, they are then put into first, second, and third class classifications.

There were only three schools in Dade County to receive honors. Miami High received a medalist in the group of schools with over 2500 enrollment.

Miami Beach received a medalist class rating in the group with more than 1000 enrollments. Hialeah also had first class rating where there were more than 2000 students enrolled.

## Science Fair Prizes Awarded

Sponsored by the University of Miami, Miami Herald, Dade County Science Teachers Association, and the Dade County Council of Teachers of Math; South Florida again held its 5th annual Science Fair. March 18, 19, 20 and 21 were the dates for the exhibition at the Dinner Key Auditorium which proved to be an unique as well as an excellent opportunity for some would-be scientist to unveil his prize exhibit.

Students in Grades 7 through the 12 in South Florida, public, private, and parochial schools were eligible in the three divisions. They were: Senior division with grades 10, 11, and 12. Only individual entries in chemistry, electronics, physics, engineering, zoology, botany, and mathematics were eligible. The individual entries for the 9th grade or upper junior division consisted of chemistry, astronomy, electricity, biology and math. Chemistry, rocketry, astronomy, electricity, zoology, botany, and math are eligible for the lower junior division of the 7th and 8th grades.

### SUPER PRIZES AWARDED

The Senior division grand prizes consist of two trips to the two outstanding exhibitors to the National Science Fair competition in Hartford, Connecticut, May 6, 7, 8, and 9; a University of Miami tuition scholarship open only to seniors and a 5-day Navy Cruise open to male students in 10th and 11th grades. A 19-volume set of World Book Encyclopedia is the Upper Junior grand prize and a 10-volume set of Books of Popular Science to the lower junior division winner.

### SCORES BASED ON VARIOUS EXHIBITS

The judges scored the exhibits

in various types; creative ability scored 30 points and consisted of original materials, ideas, and purpose worth. Also 30 points was given to the scientific thought in organization method, and amount of study. Thoroughness scored 10 points and skill—how it works, handling, and mounting scored 10 points also. Eye appeal and stimulate interest drawn scored 10 points.

Entries from Hialeah High were: Tom Mullaney, entered chemistry with his amphoterism in a non-aqueous system. Alex Alfaro entered in the physics division a 6" astronomical photographic telescope as companion for the visual observation telescope. Bill Rothermel's comparative analysis of radioactivity in air and vegetation was entered in the physics division which won him a first place. John Olivero's cloud chamber wouldn't work so he was disqualified. Lynn Delozar entered his scorpion venom in the biology class and the girls entering were: Carol Stevens who entered her project on rats, and Sandy Kraczyk entered the effect of UV radiation

on bacteria in the presence and absence of oxygen.

Prizes were awarded Saturday, March 21st.
