

BERNIE BROKE SCORING RECORDS

During the 1959 season, Bernie broke three scoring records and led the Thoroughbreds to one of their best seasons in history. In a game against Broward he scored 61 points to set a new single-game scoring record which will be very hard to top.

His season total of 645 points was 56 better than Richie Berger's (Miami Beach) 589 set in 1958. Bernie broke this record with three games remaining in the season.

He also compiled a 29.6 average for 22 games to break another record and outscore everyone in the state by doing this. His only disappointment was that the T-Breds didn't get to go to the State Basketball Tournament in Gainesville.

The slender senior from Syracuse, New York, was very excited when he received the news that he had been picked as one of the top five players in the country. He had won many awards but this was the tops. He said, "I feel that this is the greatest honor that a high-school player can receive. It's just the greatest."
