Seniors Try Job Tests

The Florida State Employment Test was administered to H.H.S. Seniors on April 14. The purpose of this test was to see how many seniors were capable of entering the world of business.

The test consisted of such skills as typing, dictation, spelling and shorthand. First on the program was the ten-minute timed writing, which was checked for accuracy and speed. Following was a test of shorthand achievement, consisting of dictation at 8:00 p.m. to be written, then translated by typewriter. A spelling test of 100 words ended the examination.

Only seniors with good averages in shorthand, dictation, spelling, and typing, were eligible for the test. It will determine what occupation in the field of business will benefit each individual's ability.
