Students Will Go To Scout 'City'

"New frontiers" lie ahead for more than 8,000 girls as they follow trails north, south, east, or west to the Senior Girl Scout Roundup to be held July 3-12, outside Colorado Springs.

There, on ranchland of the Colorado prairie, a "city" of 6,000 tents will spring up in a day. There Girl Scouts and Guides from all over the world will reach "a mile high—a world wide" as they seek new frontiers of interest and understanding, of friendship, of living the Girl Scout code.

These girls will come from every state in the union, from every U. S. territory and possession, from "troops on foreign soil," from all five continents where members of the World Association of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts are found! Eight thousand girls will pour into the Roundup site, no two alike! But all Girl Scouts and Guides, all meeting the same qualifications, all sharing the same principles.

24 girls were chosen out of Dade County to represent this section of the state. After weeks of training and competition the final tryouts and eliminations were held. Two H.H.S. Thoroughbreds were among these lucky candidates selected, Sandy Lee and Mary Ann Gillespie drew top honor from another division.

According to the the Round-up Guide, the main objective of the convention is to develop greater awareness of the real meaning of the Girl Scout code.

To help girls "grow in ability to understand many different kinds of people, to respect and appreciate the contribution each person makes.

To recognize the value of different geographic, cultural and religious backgrounds; that she will gain new understanding of her own country and its place in a wider world; and that she will develop new and lasting interests that will enrich her life."

Many of the activities will be similar to those in Girl Scout camps everywhere. Arts and crafts, cooking out of doors, or singing around the campfires and along the trails.

"The values to be gained will remain long after more tangible evidence of the Roundup has disappeared, claims Scout Mary Ann Gillespie.
