

Early Birds Plan Seven Period Day

For the first time in the history of Hialeah High School, it will be possible for students to schedule seven classes a day due to the innovation dubbed the "early bird" class.

This unique plan will enable students to enroll in an additional subject or elective even with a full schedule of courses. The classes, one class each for sophomores, juniors, and seniors, will be held before school at 7:30 in the morning. A required subject such as history or English will comprise the classes.

Only those students who were asked to attend the special orientation session in the cafeteria were eligible to schedule the class. They all were students of high scholastic averages, and had proved themselves capable of the additional work.

Through this plan, the eligible students may sign up for an elective such as typing or music, which they were formerly unable to do. This extra class, under Florida State law, cannot qualify for a graduation credit unless the student needs another credit to fulfill graduation requirements.

In this way, qualified students will have an opportunity to supplement their high school education and gain further and more extensive background for college work.

Bowling Is Top Sport for All—May or January

Boys Bowl at Palm Springs
Physical education classes for boys are now undertaking the popular sport of bowling. The boys bowl once a week at the Palm Springs Lanes, playing one string in a day, at 35c a string. The Palm Springs Lanes provides transportation both ways for the boys plus other additional services and advice.

Girl's Team Scores High

H. H. S. Joins in National Youth Fitness Week

Hialeah participated in National Youth Fitness Week, May 3 through 9, by giving all boys' physical education classes the American Association for Health, Physical Education, and Recreation test.

The beginning of National Youth Fitness Week was in 1955, when President Dwight D. Eisenhower and many military leaders were disturbed by the number of American youths who were physically unfit for the Armed Services.

The American Association for Health, Physical Education, and Recreation, after much research, devised a test to measure physical fitness which will be administered in many schools, including Hialeah, throughout the United States.

President Eisenhower has declared May 3-9 as National Youth Fitness Week in the hopes that all may become more aware of fitness of mind and body.

"Our team (in the contest with Russia) is made up every individual in America." President Eisenhower continues, "We need to make each one the best player that can be put on the field. This requires fitness in its deepest and broadest sense—a healthy body, and alert, discipline mind. In this meaning, fitness is the individual's maximum development for the nation's good."

The national test that was conducted at Hialeah last week consisted of pull ups, sit ups, shuttle run, broad jump, 50-yard dash, soft ball throw for distance, and a 600 yard walk-run test.

Hialeah was the first school in Dade County to give a physical fitness test. In 1956, the Navy Physical Fitness test was given at the start of school and again at the end of the school year. It was found that 91.1% of the boys improved their Physical Fitness index.

"H.H.S. is proud to participate in this nation-wide project," stated Coach Sal Susi, head of the physical education department. "I am confident that the boys' classes will be above the national average on the AAHPER fitness test."

Ann Landers Aids HHS Teeners

a question and answer period. They felt that steady dating is important to teenagers and discussion on these would have proved invaluable.

However, despite the limited time, the consensus was that Miss Landers did an excellent job, and if she helped even one troubled student in the audience, then her job was filled, and filled well.
