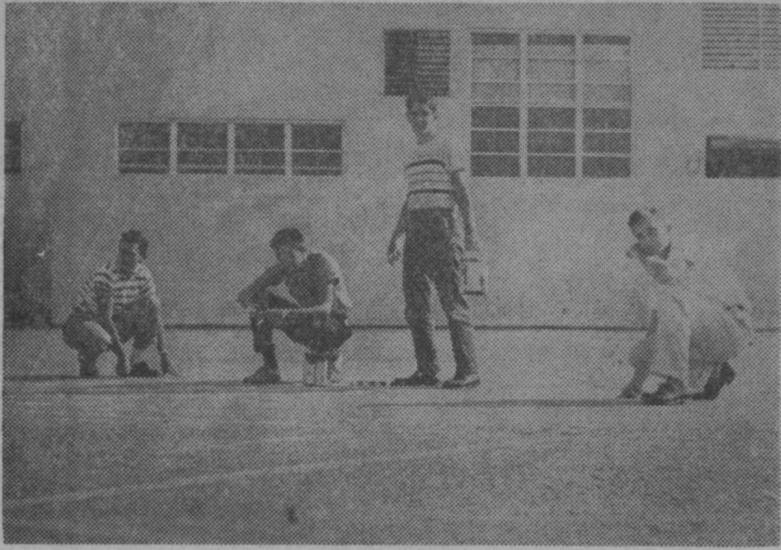


Key Club Marks Senior Parking
