Spanish Class 'Miniature' Lab

A "miniature laboratory has been set up in the classroom of Mr. George Sirianni, Hialeah Spanish teacher, and will soon hold equipment for a program which will improve student Spanish comprehension.

Hialeah is one of three schools to participate in the program which was begun here as an experiment last year and found to be successful enough to continue.

One corner of the classroom, Room 612, has been divided by a curtain on a movable tract. Here a tape recorder with several earphones will be placed and several students may work without distraction by others in the room.

Only those listening on the earphones will be able to hear the tape recorder and this will enable the class to be divided into separate work groups, in regular classwork and at the recorder.

Asked if he believed the experiment had shown any success Mr. Sirianni stated, "Although there is no means of measuring, from the students I've worked with, I would certainly lean toward a 'yes'".

Conversation will be used on the recorder and pupils will listen and translate what they hear.
