When questioned on Hialeah's opponents this year, Lannom felt that we face a very rough schedule.

He stated "Central Catholic is the Curley of Broward County. I even heard that they are bigger than the Knights and are expected to give us a tough time. They finally have an organization behind them, now having a head coach and two assistants, who will sub as head coach for other major sports. It should be a great game since we are both starting our first season in the Gold Coast Conference."

North Miami May Be Champ

When asked who the team to beat in the G.C.C. is, he answered, "North Miami has finally gotten its tradition behind them and they are putting all their emphasis on football. South Broward is not to be forgotten either. They have one of the best teams in South Florida. Also, Ft. Lauderdale always has a good team."

"Miami Beach is the only team in the Gold Coast Conference that the Thorobreds play that does not count in our standings because they are in the Southern Division. To straighten this situation out we should make this point clear to you: any team in the Northern Division that plays a Southern team does not count in the standings. The standings are comprised only of games where teams from the same District face each other."

Coach Lannom continued, "Jackson should have a terrific team this season. They are big and rugged. They had the best 10th grade team in the county last year and have expectations of a big year."

200 Turn Out for Football

"Edison should be tough, also. Any school that has a turnout of some 200 boys for football has very few problems in putting together a good team."

"In closing I would like to say that I am personally happy to have five of the top teams around (Edison, Jackson, Ft. Lauderdale, North Miami and Central Catholic) come to the Hialeah Stadium for their games."
