The sport began in Germany about A.D. 200 or 300. Various forms of bowling were popular in

European countries during the Middle Ages. The first indoor game of bowling was in London in the 1600's.

The Dutch called it "skittles" and brought it with them to New Amsterdam (New York City) about 1800. It became so popular that it was outlawed and a game of "nine-pins" was illegal. The advocates of bowling got around this law by adding another pin thus the game emerged as it is known today.

The modern bowling alleys are a long way from the bowling that the imaginary little men of Hendrick Hudson did when they invited Rip Van Winkle to roll a game with them, and have a spot of ale. They are far, too, from the rough indoor alleys of the Dutch in New Amsterdam. Today the gleaming golden lanes, echo the thud of the thrown ball. Automatic pin setters take the place of the old fashioned pin boy and make bowling an easy and enjoyable sport.

The object of the game is to knock down all ten pins in one throw. If you succeed, it is called a strike. If not, you get another throw and try to knock down the rest of the pins. If all ten pins are knocked down in two tries, it is a spare. A perfect game is 300, a star bowler 200 and average 160.

It might be interesting to note that the average score of the bowlers of the physical education classes are considerably lower.
