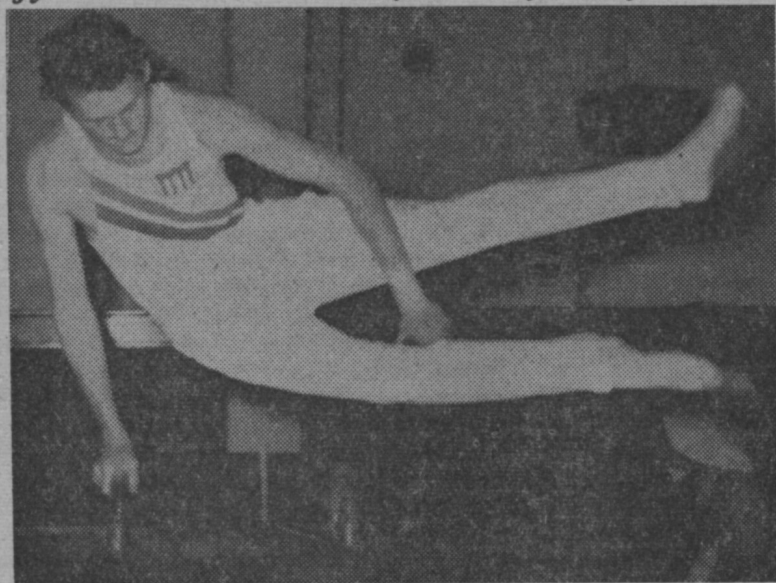


### Gymnasts Work Out for Very Busy Season

### Thoroughbreds Squeeze By McArthur 12 to 7

Paul Donaldson's 42-yard run in the final four minutes of play gave the Hialeah Thoroughbreds a 12 to 7 victory over the McArthur Mustangs last week at South Broward Field.

After battling through three-quarters of defensive play, the T-Breds scored their first touchdown but failed in their attempt to make the extra point. Immediately following, on the kickoff return, Tank Bowers romped 85 yards for the Mustangs' lone touchdown.

Hialeah then started their second touchdown drive. Sparked by the outstanding running of halfback, Bob Tafel, the Hialeahs couldn't be stopped. Several passes from Dick Krtausch to Lewis Moran were heralded in the drive. Donaldson took over the ball club on the McArthur 40-yard line and then did some beautiful broken-field running around left end for the Thoroughbreds' second touchdown. Dick Krtausch failed to make the extra point in a run around right end.

Showers started just previously to game time and had been threatening continuously that day. This held the crowd to a minimum.

This was the Mustangs second loss in a row. They started the season by winning their first two games. They are expected to join the Northern Division of the Gold Coast Conference next year.

### Bulldogs Much Improved

South Broward's "Bulldogs" move into Hialeah Stadium on November 1 for a Gold Coast Conference game in which the outcome will be very important to the standings.

Ft. Lauderdale has all but clinched the top position, but the "Flying L's" will have a rougher time in trying to capture its fourth consecutive Conference title. They will have to play the winner of the Southern Division on December 6 in the Orange Bowl.

South Broward opened their season by losing their first two games to Pompano, 7-0, and Key West, 21-6. They then captured their first Conference game by shutting out North Miami in a 6-0 defensive battle. They also topped the Miami Beach Typhoons.

Speed merchant Allan Wright leads the Bulldogs at halfback. The 65 yard run gave them their lone touchdown against North Miami. Wright is the State Champion in the hundred-yard dash.

Broward's pass pattern is weak but quarterback Mickey Preng is unpredictable in his calling of plays. Two-thirds of the time Wright carries the ball.

Head Coach Bill Brennan has had player trouble all season. Preceding their contest with the Pioneer's, Brennan dropped eight players from his squad, leaving him the smallest team (in number) in South Florida. He said that their surprising decline was due to lack of hustle. Since then the Bulldogs have regained the desire a good ball club needs.

Their defense is powerful and should be rough to handle. The linemen are big and also fast. The starting line averages 170 pounds.

Standouts defensively are John Francis, tackle; Butch Smith, guard; and center, Mickey Yasko.

### Lauderdale Came, Saw, Conquered, and Left—Minus One Bell

It was the Thursday before the Fort Lauderdale-Hialeah football contest. The usual group of players were working out on the Phys. Ed. field around six o'clock. Many of these players were out for their first practice of the important week, due to an epidemic of flu at Hialeah. Head Coach Hal Lannom called the boys to a huddle and asked them to decide if they were ready to play the "Flying L's" Saturday night. After the coaches departed the boys held a conference and then charged into the dressing room with the verdict that they were ready.

Whether they were in shape or not is not important. They played their best, but it was far from enough. Ft. Lauderdale went home with a 33-7 victory under their belt. Fullback Allan Aunapu ran roughshod over the T-Breds, scor-

ing twice and gathering 222 yards in holes made for a horse to go through.

Hialeah actually played 72 minutes of football, due to a fault in the scoreboard clock. Instead of twelve minute quarters, the clock gave the two teams 18 minutes of action in each frame.

When civilized Hialeah rooters watched the game with tearful eyes, others held traveling fights under the bleachers and midway in the fourth quarter decided to make off with the Ft. Lauderdale bell which was toted from the

Broward County school. Streams of youngsters ran across the field, ignoring the game en route to the parking lot.

Hialeah's lone touchdown came on a 13-yard pass from Dick Krtausch to Lou Moran in the fourth quarter.
