Class Rings Now on Sale!

Now is the time for you to put in your order for class rings. There are two types of rings, metal and stone, and three sizes, small, medium, and large. They run from approximately \$20 to \$25. November 7 is the deadline, and you can get an order blank from your homeroom teacher.

Seniors not having ordered their senior rings before this time should do so. Juniors who wish to order their rings during their junior year may order them at this time also.

A deposit of five dollars is to be paid upon ordering of the rings with the balance due upon delivery. A ring display is in the showcase of room 208. Ring sizes and prices will be available to homeroom teachers who check them out from Mrs. Lucy Doby, in the main office.

A special bulletin was received by homeroom teachers for the purpose of distribution to their students. These are to be filled out and presented when rings are ordered.

New Project Work of S. C.

"I hereby declare I shall do my utmost to drive carefully and observe all rules of the road for the 1958-59 school year". This was the pledge signed by Thorobreds participating in the County-wide Safe Driving project, to be conducted in all Senior High Schools.

The purpose of this campaign, sponsored by the Miami Rotary Club, is to recognize careful teenage drivers. Registration was opened for one week, starting November 3 and closing November 7, 1958.

Homeroom Student Council representatives issued applications to those students who felt that they could operate a motor vehicle for the rest of the school term without an accident or without a moving vehicle violation.

Each participant was required to bring his valid operator's license at the time of application. Students with learner's permits were not eligible to register for this project.

If no citation for a moving vehicle violation is posted on his license and he has not been involved in a moving vehicle accident as a driver, for this period, from November 3-May 18, the entrant will then sign the "No-Accident" form on the bottom of the original registration blank.

Before the last day of school, each student who completes the "No-Accident" form will receive an attractive sticker to affix to his rear car window with the following inscription:

H who knows, and knows that he knows, is wise, follow him."

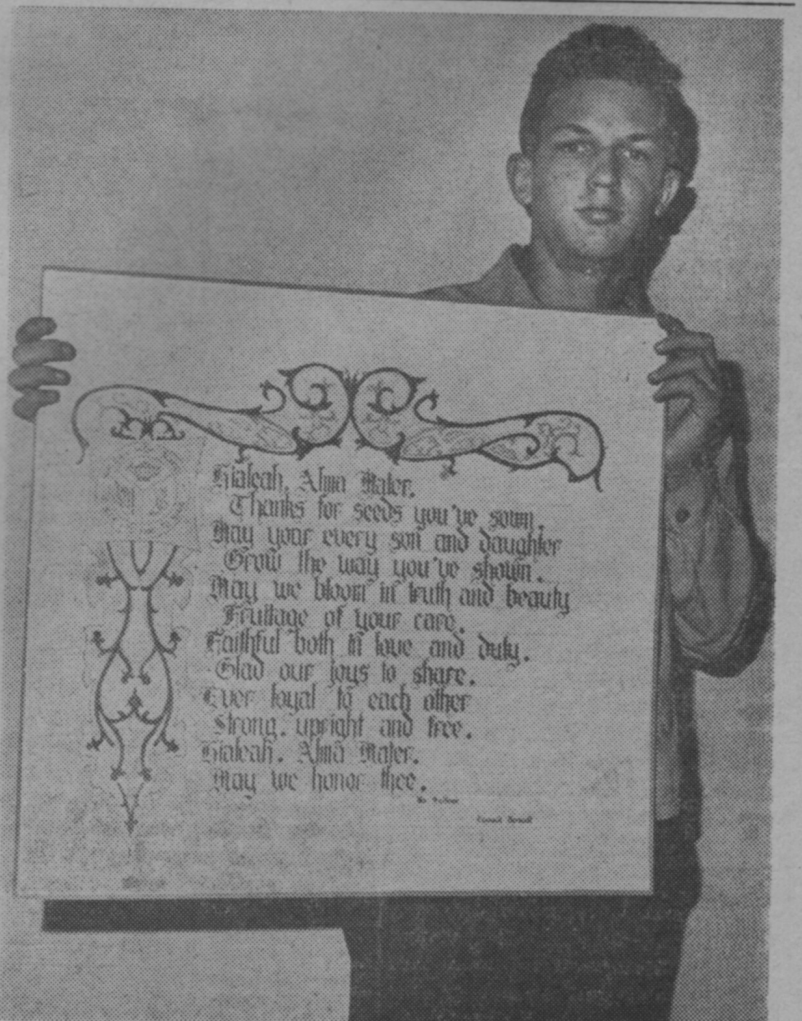
Bandstand Features H. H. S.
