Test Develops Library Skill

A standardized test on library knowledge is being given to all accelerated junior and senior English classes in order to develop skill in library science.

Originated for college freshman, it was used to determine whether a new student needed to take a course in library science. By giving it to students still in high school, teachers will be able to judge which fields students find the most difficult. Thus they can plan their curricula to include such points.

The test, in the form of a small pamphlet, consists of work concerning the use of reference books, card catalogues, bibliographies, and distinguishing certain library abbreviations. There are 80 questions on the test.

The general consensus is that the tests are of benefit to all students; on library knowledge.
