### Students Work With Scorpions

Lynn De Lozier and Dale Gash are experimenting with scorpions to see some of the effects their poison has in the blood stream of white albino rats in order to prepare a serum to protect against their sting, in Miss Wright's fourth period Chemistry class.

A process called "milking" is used to extract some of the poison on a slide and is then diluted and injected into the rats. Paint without lead in it to protect the scorpions, has been used to paint a dotted code on their backs so the students will know which ones have been "milked."

Since some scorpions are cannibalistic, the female has to be separated from her newborn because either the mother's body is provided as food for the young or the young provides food for the mother.

One of Miss Wright's students, Lynn De Lozier collected the specimens from a field near his home,
