WIN OVER PIONEERS

The mail must go through rain, sleet, or snow. If it is raining, the Thoroughbreds should carry the mail, because they proved they could carry and kick the ball in the worst kind of weather, Wednesday, November 26.

When the game started there was just a light drizzle, but when the final whistle blew, it looked as if the two teams might have to swim off the field. At the conclusion of the game, 3,491 drenched fans barely enough to fill the top rows in the Bowl, left after watching Hialeah win, 2-0, when left tackle Jerry Sullivan blocked a punt in the North Miami end zone for a safety.

In the first half, the ball switched hands several times without either team scoring. Hialeah gained 30 yards while North Miami picked up 96.

Hialeah's big moment came in the third quarter, when Tom Baxley punted twice for the Pioneers only to have penalties called both times, which put the ball a mere 18 inches away from the North Miami goal. Baxley never got to kick the third time, because senior cocaptain Sullivan charged through in the first round. the mud splattered line to block the kick for the only score in the game.

Hialeah was content to play defensive ball for the rest of the game, kicking quite often on first down. North Miami, who have been troubled with fumbling all season, could never hold on to the slippery pigskin long enough to score, and the Thoroughbreds came out a wet but happy 2-0 winner, to end the season with a 6-4 rec-

Graduating co-captains Dick Krtausch and Jerry Sullivan, along with the rest of the senior players in their final game, have just cause to feel proud. The deft ball handling of Krtausch and the alert ball hawking of Sullivan were major factors in the Thoroughbred's closing the season on a winning

Unfortunately the marching Thoroughbred band and the baton twirlers could not present the half time show, because of the driving rain. They had been practicing for two weeks, so they could present a fine show for the last game of the season.

For Tilt With Coral Gables

Hialeah's cagers open their 1958-59 basketball season against Coral Gables this Friday night at The Coral Gables Gymnasium (Bird and LeJeune Roads) at 8:30 p.m. A junior varsity game preceeds the varsity tilt at 7:00.

The Thoroughbreds workouts some six weeks ago and their practices have proved they are one of the top teams in the county.

Their schedule contains two games with every team in the Northern Division of the Gold Coast Conference and two games with every team in District Eight-Class AA Division, plus two with Miami Edison and West Palm Beach.

Last season the T-Breds (not then in the GCC) topped Miami Beach to win the District Eight Championship. They traveled to Gainesville and lost in the semifinals to Jacksonville Landon. Miami Edison was also knocked out

Hialeah lost only four games last year to three teams. They lost to Pomano in the South Brow ard Invitational: to Coral Gables by two points, in a sudden death overtime; to Pompano, once again; and to Miami Edison in the final game of the season. The Thoroughbreds defeated each of these teams the other time they faced them.

Four of the top players are returning to the court. All-City star, Bernie Butts, will return to his guard position and Dick Krtausch will probably start in the other guard slot.

Tony Cocco and Vern Futrell are lined up for starting berths. Although Futrell suffered a broken ankle in an early practice session, reports say that he will be ready for the January 3 game with Miami Beach.

The Thoroughbreds wound up the game with a 26-0 victory and they had contained Beach's scoring leader and chief threat, Barry Levinson.

Paul Donaldson (playing left halfback) took a pitchout from quarterback Dick Krtausch for the first touchdown.

Little scored his first touchdown when he plowed over center for six inches in hte second quarter.

In the third period, Little scored again, this time from the three. Art Lancour kicked his second ex-

Lancour went off left tackle for elven yards and the final touchdown with two minutes remaining in the game. This ended the best defensive game of the season for the T-Breds and their offense worked as good as ever.

Hialeah Fares Vell in GCC

Hialeah's first trp in the Gold Coast Conference was a huge success during the football season.

Although South Broward (5-0) won the Northern Division title, the Thoroughbreds tied for second place with North Miami and Ft. Lauderdale. These teams won three and lost two.

Hialeah's over-all season was better than that of the other two. The T-Breds won six and lost four while the Flying "L's" had a 5-4 record. North Miami was 4-5-1.

Only two teams in the Southern Division had better records. Southwest went undefeated in five games while Curley had a 4-1 record, losing only to the Eagles.
